



AFFIDAVIT FOR ARREST WARRANT FOR THE PERSON(S) OF

**Owen Darian Ruiz, dob:10/03/2005, [REDACTED]
[REDACTED] for Murder in the First Degree, C.R.S. 18-3-102(1)(a), A Class One Felony**

Your Affiant, Detective Mark Crider, 95014, has been a police officer for the City and County of Denver since January 2, 1995. Your Affiant was promoted to the rank of detective in April of 2002 and investigated general assaults and domestic violence crimes for one year. In 2003 Your Affiant was transferred to the Child Abuse unit and investigated crimes against children to include physical abuse, sexual abuse and neglect.

In June of 2004, your Affiant was assigned to the Homicide unit in the Major Crimes Division of the Denver Police Department. Your Affiant has conducted hundreds of death investigations and has been assigned as the primary or secondary investigator in over one hundred homicide investigations. Your Affiant has completed over 300 hours of formal investigative training in homicide investigations, advanced homicide investigations, suicides, suspicious deaths, child deaths, domestic violence related homicides and gang related homicides.

Your Affiant has received formal specialized training in Crime Scene Techniques, Bloodstain Pattern Analysis, Bullet Trajectory, Crime Scene Reconstruction and Interview and Interrogation. Your Affiant has provided expert witness testimony in Denver District Court in the field of Bloodstain Pattern Analysis and Crime Scene Reconstruction.

Your Affiant obtained the following information from personal observations, interviewing witnesses and reviewing police reports of fellow officers. The facts tending to establish the grounds for issuance of a Search Warrant are as follows:

Your Affiant obtained the following information from personal observations, interviewing witnesses, speaking with fellow officers and/or reviewing police reports and other written documentation:

On April 23, 2022, at 6:19 p.m., the Denver Communications Bureau received several 911 calls regarding a shooting at the Denver Skatepark located at 2205 19th Street, Denver, CO. The 911 callers reported that a victim was down in the street and the suspects had fled the scene in a dark colored sedan.

Denver police officers and Denver Health Medical Center paramedics responded to the scene and located the victim, subsequently identified as [REDACTED], dob: [REDACTED] lying in the street suffering from apparent gunshot wounds. Officers cordoned off the crime scene while paramedics transported the victim to Denver Health Medical Center. The victim was pronounced dead at Denver Health Medical Center at 6:38 p.m., by Doctor Sungar.

At approximately 6:40 p.m., your Affiant and Detective Brian Lang were called out to investigate the homicide. Your Affiant responded to Denver Police Headquarters to conduct witness interviews and Detective Lang responded to the scene to assist in the crime scene investigation.

Witness [REDACTED] told your Affiant that he knows the victim from the skatepark. The victim had accidentally locked his keys in the trunk of his car and was looking for someone with a slim-jim to unlock his car. [REDACTED] told the victim that [REDACTED] may have a slim-jim and [REDACTED] was parked across the street. [REDACTED] said that the victim walked over towards [REDACTED] car but stopped at a newer black Chevrolet sedan. [REDACTED] said that he then heard shots fired and observed a Black male, associated with the black colored Chevrolet, fire several shots at the victim. The victim stepped backwards and fell onto the street. The shooter and up to three occupants then fled the scene in the dark colored sedan.

Your Affiant interviewed several other witnesses who reported that unknown males associated with a dark colored sedan, possibly a Chevrolet Malibu, shot the victim and drove off in the vehicle.

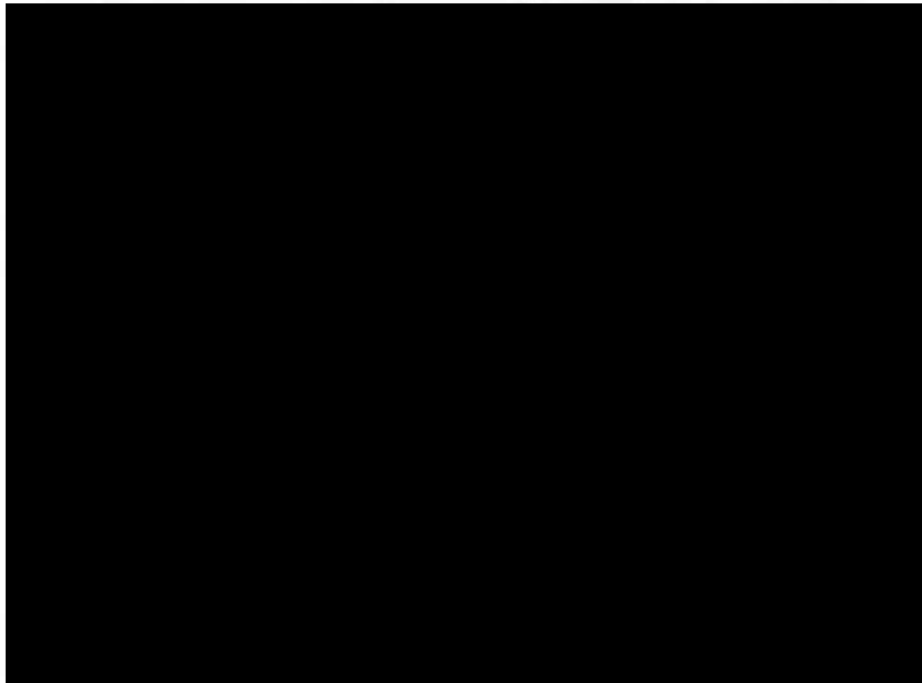
The City and County of Denver has several High Activity Location Observation (HALO) surveillance cameras that record incidents throughout the city. Your Affiant confirmed that an operational HALO camera was located at the Denver Skatepark. Your Affiant viewed the recordings from this camera and made the following observations starting at 6:17 p.m., on April 23, 2022:

- The victim walked across 19th Street
- A black four door sedan (possibly a late model Chevrolet Malibu) was parallel parking in the street in the area where the victim was walking
- The victim began to walk back across the street but stopped and looked towards the dark sedan that had just parked

The recording went into a buffering mode (freezes) and several seconds of the recording are not observed. When the recording continued:

- The victim was standing outside of the driver's side of the dark sedan
- The rear driver's side door opened, and the victim began running away from the vehicle as the suspect exited the vehicle.
- The victim then fell to the street
- The suspect vehicle then drove off





During the crime scene investigation Detective Lang and Crime Scene Investigators located six 9mm fired cartridges in the street where the victim was shot.

On April 25, 2022, your Affiant and Detective Lang attended the external examination portion of the autopsy of [REDACTED], dob: [REDACTED] at the Denver Office of the Medical Examiner. Forensic Pathologist Ian Puffenberger conducted the autopsy. The victim had three apparent gunshot wounds to the upper torso and the tentative cause of death is gunshot wounds to the upper torso.

On July 8, 2022, Forensic Pathologist Ian Puffenberger signed out the completed autopsy report and indicated the Cause of Death is gunshot wound to the torso and the Manner of Death is Homicide.

During this investigation, your Affiant researched and viewed numerous computer images of possible vehicles that match the description of the suspect vehicle and believed the suspect vehicle to be a late model Chevrolet Malibu between the years of 2018-2022.

On April 25, 2022, your Affiant contacted Denver Police Fleet Supervisor Jeff Navarro. Mr. Navarro is tasked with equipping, maintaining, and repairing all Denver Police vehicles. Your Affiant asked Mr. Navarro to view images of the suspect vehicle from the HALO recordings and attempt to determine the make, model and year of the vehicle. Your Affiant sent Mr. Navarro several screen shots of the suspect vehicle from the HALO recording. Approximately one hour later Mr. Navarro advised your Affiant that he believed the suspect vehicle was a 2019-2020 Chevrolet Malibu. Your Affiant called Mr. Navarro and he advised that he viewed the suspect vehicle screen shots with two other Fleet Technicians, and they all believe the vehicle is a late model black Chevrolet Malibu. They believed the vehicle year is a 2019 or 2020, but it could be a 2021 or 2022.

On April 27, 2022, at approximately 4:00 p.m., your Affiant went to Stevenson Chevrolet Automobile dealership at 15000 W. Colfax Avenue. Your Affiant showed several salesmen screen shots of the

suspect vehicle from the HALO recordings and asked if they could determine the make, model and year of the vehicle. The Chevrolet salesman agreed the vehicle is a late model Chevrolet Malibu, possibly a 2018 or newer.

Your Affiant knows that many newer model cars are equipped to communicate with the cellular networks of major providers. This communication occurs through a cellular device installed by the manufacturer at the time of manufacture and allows the vehicle to operate as a "Wi-Fi hotspot" and allows users to make/receive voice calls and send/receive SMS (text) message through the vehicle's cellular connection. Data connections over the cellular network allow the manufacturer to send software updates to the vehicle and monitor vehicle performance. The cellular device, which operates like a cellular phone, is assigned an "International Mobile Equipment Identity" (IMEI), which is analogous to the serial number of a cellular phone. It is also assigned an "International Mobile Subscriber Identity" (IMSI), which, like a cellular phone, identifies a specific subscriber on a carrier's network. It is also assigned a "Mobile Station Integrated Services Digital Network" (MSISDN), which is a phone number used to also identify the vehicle on the cellular network.

Because the device operates like a cellular phone on a provider's network, the records, information and services sought by your Affiant for the aforementioned vehicle are maintained in the course of regular business by the cellular provider in the same fashion as they keep cellular records for a cellular subscriber. Your Affiant has learned that all the cellular providers provide cellular access to connected cars, but AT&T is the primary provider for such vehicle systems. Your Affiant has learned that AT&T can "flip" a vehicle identification number on a supported vehicle to determine the IMEI, IMSI, and MSISDN assigned to the vehicle and locate any business records they maintain during the course of regular business for that account. In reverse, your Affiant knows that AT&T can "flip" an IMEI, IMSI, and MSISDN and identify a connected car on their network in many cases. Your Affiant also knows that a cellular provider can provide real-time location data based on a device's IMEI.

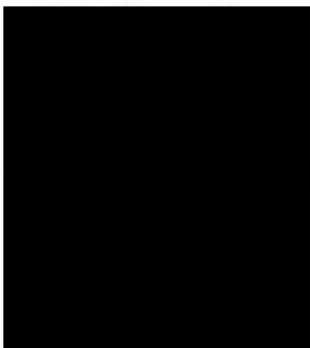
On April 29, 2022, your Affiant submitted a tower dump search warrant. That warrant was signed by the Honorable Judge Rudolph on that same date. As stated above, your Affiant knows that AT&T can identify devices that accessed a cell site during a data connection in a standard tower dump. It was your Affiant's believe that the suspect vehicle was a newer vehicle and likely had a data plan with AT&T. Because of this, your Affiant believed it was probable identifiers for the vehicle would be captured during a tower dump of the area of the homicide during the relevant time frame.

Your Affiant sought the assistance of ATF Special Agent (SA) Mark Sonnendecker to review responsive data from AT&T pursuant to the tower dump search warrant. SA Sonnendecker is an expert in analysis of cellular records and has knowledge of AT&T and connected cars. SA Sonnendecker advised from his training and experience that AT&T assigns a unique IMSI to IOT (Internet of Things) devices on the network. An IMSI is a unique identifier that identifies a subscriber on a cellular account.

SA Sonnendecker reviewed the tower dump data from AT&T and looked mainly at the timeframe of 6:10 PM – 6:20 PM, which was the timeframe the suspect vehicle was believed to be in the general area and then seen on the HALO camera attempting to park. Because the vehicle was believed to be a Chevy Malibu, SA Sonnendecker searched for events that had an APN of OnStar. SA Sonnendecker advised that an APN is Access Point Name and defines the type of connection the user (in this instance a connected car) is making to access the AT&T network. SA Sonnendecker advised that OnStar is a

subsidiary company of General Motors (who manufactures Chevrolet vehicles) that provides connected car users with subscription-based communications, emergency services, remote diagnostic systems, and other services. SA Sonnendecker knew from his training and experience that the most effective way to identify a General Motors vehicle within an AT&T tower dump was to isolate devices associated with the OnStar APN.

SA Sonnendecker looked at all OnStar-related connected cars captured in the tower dump. Because the timeframe of the murder was known, SA Sonnendecker excluded any connected cars that initiated a data session after 6:20 PM on the cell site. SA Sonnendecker included any connected cars that initiated a data session between 6:10 PM 6:19 PM on the cell site. Based on that analysis, SA Sonnendecker identified the following IMSIs as having an OnStar APN and had data events captured between 6:10 PM 6:19 PM:



On May 1, 2022, your Affiant submitted a warrant to compel AT&T to provide identifying information about the vehicles with the above-listed IMSIs. That warrant was approved by the Honorable Tanya E. Wheeler on that same day and served upon AT&T that same day. Based on responsive data from AT&T, your Affiant learned that one of these vehicles was a 2022 Chevy Malibu (assigned IMSI 310170123241571). The other vehicles were trucks, SUVs, and a sedan that did not match the suspect vehicle description. This information led investigators to believe that this connected car was the suspect vehicle seen on surveillance video.

Your Affiant queried law enforcement databases and learned the vehicle was a rental car that belonged to Enterprise Rent-a-Car. Your Affiant called and spoke with Enterprise Rent-a-Car personnel and learned the vehicle was rented by a person named [REDACTED] on 04/20/2022. Your Affiant later learned from Enterprise Rent -a-Car that on 5/2/2022 [REDACTED] returned the vehicle to Enterprise. Your Affiant learned that [REDACTED] provided Enterprise Rent-a-Car with cellular telephone number [REDACTED]. Your Affiant queried this phone number through law enforcement databases and noted the number was associated to [REDACTED]. Your Affiant also noted the [REDACTED] phone number was subscribed through Verizon Wireless.

Your Affiant reviewed a background check completed on [REDACTED], dob: [REDACTED], and learned that he had filed in insurance claim for a vehicle accident that occurred in Aurora, CO on 04/18/2022. [REDACTED] vehicle was described as a 2016 Jeep Patriot, VIN [REDACTED]. When your Affiant spoke with Enterprise, the employee advised that it appeared the rental was related to an insurance claim by [REDACTED].

On May 4, 2022, Denver County Court Judge Cherry reviewed and approved a Search Warrants to obtain [REDACTED] cell phone Call Detail Records ([REDACTED]) from Verizon Wireless and records from AT&T for MSISDN: [REDACTED]; IMSI [REDACTED], which are the identified devices that the 2022 Chevy Malibu, uses to connect to cell towers.

Your Affiant received the requested cell phone records for [REDACTED] phone number from Verizon Wireless and the 2022 Chevy records from AT&T. The records reported that the phone number is [REDACTED], the IMEI #is [REDACTED], the IMSI # is [REDACTED] and the phone is an I-phone, X, Silver, 64GB.

Your Affiant forwarded the records to S/A Sonnendecker for analysis. S/A Sonnendecker advised your Affiant that the records indicate that [REDACTED] cell phone and the 2022 Chevy Malibu were utilizing cell towers in the same geographic area at similar times on the day of the murder. The two devices were utilizing towers in the same geographic areas at similar times throughout the Denver Metro area and not just in one specific location. It should be noted that Verizon Wireless did not indicate any calls or activity from approximately 2:00 p.m. through approximately 6:45 p.m., on the day of the murder.

Your Affiant believes that because the 2022 Chevy Malibu communication device and [REDACTED] cell phone were in the same geographic areas at the same time on the day of the murder, it is reasonable to believe that [REDACTED] was with the Chevy Malibu on the day of the murder.

On May 9, 2022, your Affiant received a NIBN report regarding this investigation. NIBN is The National Integrated Ballistic Information Network which is a national database similar to CODIS (Combined DNA Index System) and AFIS (Automated Fingerprint Identification System) that uploads and stores images of fired cartridge cases for correlation. The system utilizes 2D and 3D imagery of cartridge cases to identify links between previously unassociated criminal incidents. According to the confirmed report, on 4/21/2022 Thornton police officers located fired cartridges in an apartment building parking lot at [REDACTED] Pearl Street, Thornton, CO, during an Illegal Discharge of a Firearm investigation. These fired cartridges were compared to the fired cartridges recovered at the murder scene of Juan Herrera- Lozano, dob: [REDACTED] that occurred on April 23, 2022. The results confirmed the fired cartridges were fired from the same firearm.

On May 11, 2022, Your Affiant drafted a Search Warrant to obtain records from Enterprise Leasing LLC to obtain rental records for the 2022 Chevy Malibu, CO license plate [REDACTED], VIN [REDACTED] from April 20, 2022, through May 3, 2022. Denver County Court Judge Blackett reviewed and approved the Sealed Search Warrant.

On May 11, 2022, your Affiant executed a Search Warrant on Enterprise Leasing Company LLC. Your Affiant subsequently received records from Enterprise Leasing indicating that the above-mentioned vehicle was rented to [REDACTED] on 04/2/02022 at 7:36 a.m. The vehicle was returned to Enterprise Leasing on 05/02/2022 at 1:12 p.m., by [REDACTED].

On May 27, 2022, your Affiant received a second NIBN notification report. This report indicated that a 9mm Taurus Firearm, S/N [REDACTED] had been recovered on 5/17/2022 in an apartment in Thornton, CO. The firearm was test fired and the fired cartridges entered into the NIBN database. This pistol, was subsequently determined to have been the pistol that fired the cartridges recovered at the murder scene

of Juan Herrera-Lozano and the fired cartridges recovered in the apartment complex in Thornton, CO. Your Affiant confirmed that no arrests had been made in the two Thornton police investigations.

On June 27, 2022, at approximately 6:57 p.m., your Affiant interviewed [REDACTED] at his home at [REDACTED], Denver, CO. Mr. Rendell acknowledged that he had recently leased a Chevy Malibu from Enterprise Rental car because his Jeep was damaged during a traffic accident. [REDACTED] said that he had not loaned the car to anyone, not one else used the car, and he was the only person with a key. He advised that he had not been to the Denver Skatepark on April 23, 2022, and he had no involvement of knowledge of this investigation. This interview was recorded on a Body Worn Camera.

On June 21, 2022, Denver County Court Judge Tanya Wheeler reviewed and approved a Search Warrant to authorize your Affiant to search for and recover [REDACTED] cell phone from his person or his 2016 Jeep Patriot.

On July 1, 2022, your Affiant contacted [REDACTED] at his workplace in Aurora, CO. Your Affiant executed the Search Warrant and recovered his cell phone which he had in his possession.

Your Affiant interviewed [REDACTED] at his workplace and conducted a second interview at Denver Police Headquarters. Prior to the second interview [REDACTED] was advised of his Miranda rights.

[REDACTED] initially said that he had no knowledge or involvement in the homicide, but eventually advised that he was at the Skatepark at the time of the murder. He advised that his friend, [REDACTED] was driving his rental car, 2022 Chevy Malibu, and they drove to Thornton, CO and picked up two young Hispanic females and a young Hispanic male. The male was [REDACTED] friend. [REDACTED] drove them to the Skate Park.

[REDACTED] said that he was in the front passenger seat of the car while [REDACTED] was attempting to park the car at the Skate Park, and he noted there were a lot of people around. He said that he was trying to sleep in the front seat of the car when he heard yelling and then heard gunshots. [REDACTED] said he believed the male in the backseat behind the driver's seat fired the gun and then got back into the car and [REDACTED] drove off.

At the conclusion of the interview [REDACTED] consented to allow your Affiant to have the data extracted from his cell phone. This was subsequently completed by members of the Denver Police Department. Your Affiant viewed the below images in the data stored in [REDACTED] cell phone:

On July 5, 2022, at approximately 3:45 p.m., your Affiant met with [REDACTED] at the Denver Police HO to return his cell phone. Your Affiant asked [REDACTED] if he had any additional information. [REDACTED] said that he recalled that the shooter in the backseat may have been wearing an ankle monitor because [REDACTED] recalled hearing some type of audio coming from the ankle monitor.

On July 8, 2022, your Affiant called Adams County Colorado Juvenile Probation Officer Samantha Schrader regarding juvenile clients with GPS monitored ankle devices. PO Schrader researched if there were any GPS ankle monitors at the Denver Skatepark on the day of the murder, April 23, 2022, at approximately 6:15 p.m. PO Schrader advised that [REDACTED], dob [REDACTED] and Owen Ruiz, dob: 10/03/2005 were both on GPS monitored ankle monitors and both were at the Denver Skate Park at the time of the murder. Ms. Schrader advised that BI Incorporated was the company who provides and monitors the GPS data on the ankle monitors.

Your Affiant reviewed the Thornton Police Department report regarding shots fired and the recovered firearm on May 17, 2022. According to the report officers responded to shots fired in an apartment complex at [REDACTED] Pearl Street. Officers received information that the suspects who fired the pistol may have run into apartment [REDACTED]. Officers subsequently contacted several juveniles including Owen Ruiz, dob [REDACTED] in apartment [REDACTED]. While in the apartment, officers located and recovered a Taurus 9mm semi-automatic pistol, S/N [REDACTED]. This pistol was subsequently examined and determine to be the firearm that was used in the Denver Skate Park murder. It should be noted that Owen Ruiz was in the same room in the apartment where the pistol was recovered.

Your Affiant also reviewed [REDACTED] phone records and located phone number [REDACTED] as an incoming and outgoing phone number. Probation Officer Schrader provided your Affiant a phone number for [REDACTED] this same phone number of [REDACTED]. Based on this information your Affiant believes that [REDACTED] friend [REDACTED] who was driving the car at the time of the murder is [REDACTED] dob: [REDACTED].

On July 27, 2022, your Affiant contacted BI Incorporated and confirmed that the company does indeed monitor and store the data related to GPS ankle monitors in Adams County Colorado.

On August 1, 2022, your Affiant drafted a Search Warrant to obtain GPS records from BI Incorporated for Owen Ruiz and [REDACTED]. Denver County Court Judge Cindy Dang reviewed and approved the Search Warrant. Your Affiant subsequently received the requested records from BI Incorporated. Your Affiant reviewed the records and confirmed the GPS data for both Owen Ruiz and [REDACTED] confirmed their location at the Denver Skatepark at the time and date of the murder of Juan Herrera-Lozano.

On August 22, 2022, at approximately 5:15 p.m., Your Affiant and Detective Huffine attempted to contact [REDACTED], dob: [REDACTED], at his listed address of [REDACTED] Carmel Circle, Aurora, CO. A male answered the door and identified himself as [REDACTED]. He advised that [REDACTED] and his parents were not home but were expected to be back at approximately 6:00 p.m. Detective Crider gave [REDACTED] a business card and advised him to have his parents call. See BWC

At approximately 5:35 p.m., your Affiant and Detective Huffine contacted [REDACTED] outside of his home at [REDACTED] Liverpool Street. During the BWC recorded conversation, [REDACTED] identified his friend [REDACTED] as [REDACTED] through [REDACTED] Colorado Driver's License photo. CO D/L [REDACTED] See BWC

At approximately 6:10 p.m., your Affiant received a call from a male who identified himself as [REDACTED] and advised that he was [REDACTED] family attorney. He advised your Affiant not to talk with his clients at this point. Your Affiant contacted Assistant Denver DA Zach McCabe and advised him of the contact and requested that he contact [REDACTED] the following day.

On November 9, 2022, at 6:15 p.m., your Affiant interviewed [REDACTED], dob: [REDACTED], at Denver Police Department HQ. [REDACTED] showed up at the police department a few minutes earlier with his parents, [REDACTED], and [REDACTED] and his attorney, Brad Lozow. Deputy District Attorney Dan Steinhauser was also present. Prior to the interview, Deputy DA Steinhauser reviewed the Proffer Agree with [REDACTED] and his attorney. After the Proffer Agreement was reviewed, your Affiant interviewed [REDACTED] with his attorney present. [REDACTED] parents requested not to be in the interview. The interview was concluded at approximately 7:47 p.m. The interview was digitally recorded. Please review the recording for complete details.

During the interview, [REDACTED] advised that on the day of the murder he was with his friend, [REDACTED], Owen Ruiz and two young females, [REDACTED] who were friends with Ruiz. [REDACTED] said that he was driving [REDACTED] rental car, [REDACTED] was in the front passenger seat and Ruiz was in the driver's side rear seat and the girls were also seated in the backseat. [REDACTED] said that he was parking at the skatepark and heard Ruiz yell to a man in the street something like "do you remember me" the male in the street replied no who are you and then Ruiz replied that it was "Owen". Ruiz got out of the car and [REDACTED] heard gunshots. [REDACTED] looked back and saw Ruiz outside of the car with his arm raised and a black colored pistol in his hand. He then saw the victim lying in the street. [REDACTED] believed that Ruiz knew the victim. [REDACTED] positively identified his friend [REDACTED], dob: [REDACTED], through Ruiz's Colorado driver's license photo [REDACTED].

On November 21, 2022, at approximately 2:30 p.m., your Affiant and Detective Denise Gomez went to the Friendly Village of the Rockies trailer park at 2100 W. 100th Avenue to search for [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] told your Affiant on November 9, 2022, that they had picked up the two girls from this location. Through Owen Ruiz's and [REDACTED] ankle monitor GPS locations, it appeared they were close to trailer [REDACTED]. Your Affiant spoke with [REDACTED], dob: [REDACTED] and asked about a young girl by the name of [REDACTED]. He advised that his daughter is [REDACTED], dob: [REDACTED], and she lives with him in trailer [REDACTED] but she was not home at the time.

On November 22, 2022, at approximately 8:00 a.m., Your Affiant interviewed [REDACTED], dob: [REDACTED], at Denver Police Headquarters. [REDACTED] is believed to be the [REDACTED] who was in the backseat of the suspect vehicle at the time of the shooting. [REDACTED] advised that she is friends with Owen, she believed his last name is Ruiz and has his name tattooed on his arm. She described him as a close friend and like a brother to her. One day Ruiz picked her up in a new rental car with two other men. [REDACTED] was driving the car. [REDACTED] was in the front passenger seat, and she was in the backseat with Owen Ruiz and her friend [REDACTED]. They drove around and eventually parked at the Denver Skatepark because the parking was free. [REDACTED] was trying to park the car, and she heard Ruiz say something like "There he goes or That's him" and then she heard shots fired. She believed that Owen fired a pistol while still in the car, but then got out of the car and fired additional shots. Owen got back into the car with a pistol in his hand and apologized to them. [REDACTED] drove off and they did not talk about what had just occurred.

[REDACTED] was initially not sure if the shooting occurred on April 23 or August 23, 2022, but towards the end of the interview she advised it occurred on April 23, 2022.

[REDACTED] positively identified her friend Owen Ruiz, dob: [REDACTED], through a photo array which consisted of photos of six individuals, as the person who fired the pistol. [REDACTED] also added that she witnessed Owen remove his GPS ankle monitor about a week after the shooting, and that he did it near her residence. This was confirmed after review of the GPS records for Owen Ruiz.

On November 28, 2022, at approximately 11:00 a.m., Your Affiant called and spoke with Juvenile Parole Officer Valerie Hansen regarding [REDACTED]. P.O. Hansen advised that on June 14, 2022, Owen Ruiz was sentenced to 1 year in the Division of Youth Services, stemming from a probation violation on unrelated charges out of Adams County, CO and was currently incarcerated at the Platte Valley Youth Services facility in Greeley, CO, with a mandatory Parole date of June 14, 2022.
